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Alcohol And The Liver Hepatology

Chronic alcohol consumption is a leading cause of chronic liver disease with broad spectrum of disorders including: fatty liver, steatohepatitis, cirrhosis, and hepatocellular carcinoma. Accumulating evidence suggests that elderly people have more severe liver injury after excessive drinking than young people, but the underlying mechanisms are not clear.

Chronic alcohol abuse causes destruction of liver cells, which results in scarring of the liver (cirrhosis), alcoholic hepatitis and cellular mutation that may lead to liver cancer. These conditions usually progress from fatty liver to alcoholic hepatitis to cirrhosis, although heavy drinkers may develop alcoholic cirrhosis without first developing hepatitis.

Alcohol use causes more than 3.3 million deaths annually worldwide and is one of the major risk factors contributing to liver diseases.¹ The Lancet Gastroenterology & Hepatology Commission by Shiv Sarin and colleagues² highlights that in the Asia-Pacific region, 24% of deaths from liver cirrhosis and other chronic liver diseases and 19% of deaths from liver cancer were attributed to alcohol use, accounting for more than 300 000 deaths each year.

Liver biopsy is rarely necessary for the diagnosis of alcohol-related liver disease, but it might be required for diagnosis in the presence of confounding features (ie, when autoimmune hepatitis, Wilson's disease, or drug-induced liver injury are suspected), when there is no history of consistent alcohol use, or when liver test results are consistently abnormal, despite confirmed and sustained abstinence from alcohol.

Our results suggest that dietary changes, including a high-fat diet and alcohol consumption, strongly affect the composition of the intestinal microflora, while the absence of bile acids rapidly induces SIBO.

Alcoholic hepatitis is an inflammation of the liver characterized by necrosis and fibrotic scarring. The definitive diagnosis of alcoholic hepatitis is made by liver biopsy. Other considerations in diagnosis include a history of chronic or current heavy alcohol consumption, an enlarged liver and blood enzyme analysis.
